# **Special Edition!** \*\*The 71st Annual NCJFCJ Conference is coming to Virginia\*\* July 27-30, 2008



The National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges will host its 71st Annual Conference in Norfolk, July 27-30, 2008. As of this writing, 430 participants, including 131 Virginians, have registered to attend. A total of 41 educational sessions will be offered on various topics relating to juvenile and family law. Of these sessions, 17 were coordinated by representatives from Virginia.

First Lady of Virginia, Anne B. Holton will deliver the keynote address for this conference. She will discuss her efforts to fundamentally change

how human services are being delivered to children and families in Virginia. She will also focus upon the necessity for teens in foster care, who are

among the most atrisk young people in our societv. to enter adulthood connected to stable adult relationships and ongoing educational opportunities and the initiatives Virginia has pursued to support these principles



Virginia Governor Timothy Kaine will introduce the First Lady and will provide an Executive Branch perspective on this work.

A number of Best Practice Courts provided guidance to NCJFCJ on the development of programs that were either originally developed for local mini-grant programs or as part of their team's ongoing support for the community.

#### **COURT IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING** JUNE 4-5, 2008

The Court Improvement Program (CIP) Advisory Committee met at the Virginia Crossings Resort on June 5, 2008. The group of attendees consisted of 16 J&DR District Court Judges, 2 J&DR Clerks, representatives from the Virginia Department of Social Services and local departments of social services, attorneys who represent DSS and parents and Guardians Ad Litem for children, a representative from Voices for Virginia's Children, and the statewide CASA Coordinator for Virginia.

The meeting included updates on the efforts of CIP and the Best Practice Courts over the past two years, a review of the ICPC Report that was submitted to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in June, an update by the First Lady of Virginia, Anne (Continued on page 3)
